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Making Beautiful Music

Amelia Island—the perfect setting for another spectacular festival.

AMELIA ISLAND IS ROUGHLY THE SIZE OF MANHATTAN, but that is where the similarity ends. Once a thriving fishing village, Amelia Island's only town, Fernandina Beach, is rich in history. A Civil War fort guards the river, and Victorian homes and inns grace the shady avenues. Shrimp boats and sleek yachts are moored where pirate ships once anchored. Fernandina Beach has welcomed them all—from colonists, buccaneers, bootleggers, smugglers, and scalawags to entrepreneurs, artists, authors, musicians and dreamers.

Join us for Festival 2004, May 30-June 20, when sunshine and music fill the air. For three performance-packed weeks, this annual Amelia Island event draws world-renowned musicians to its Victorian-era concert sites. A brass quintet opens the festival with an old-fashioned concert on Central Park. Spend an evening in a 100-year-old saloon where dancers perform a sultry tango, listen to a string quartet in a Civil War barracks by candlelight, bring a picnic basket for an afternoon concert in the park, or don a tuxedo for an elegant evening at The Ritz-Carlton, Amelia Island. The Beer and G-Strings Series is definitely a departure from the expected as the old brick walls of the historic Palace Saloon resound to the music of Piazzolla and

Vivaldi. Add the electricity of Latin dancers Chandra and Felix Solis, and featured artists such as Cho-Liang Lin, Robert McDuffie, Arnold Steinhardt, and Valentina Lisitsa, and Fernandina's "red light" district comes alive again.

The Southeast Tourism Society has named the Festival to their Top 20 Events in June. Between galas, star events, sidewalk concerts, artist's receptions, community concerts, and master classes, tour the historic downtown that has been designated one of the country's Top Ten "Distinctive Destinations" by the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

Christopher Rex, the AICMF artistic director, has been chided for being a pirate himself and stands accused of stealing our hearts. No one can argue with that. Classical guitarist Pepe Romero sums it up best when he says, "Music is a manifestation of love. When you are touched by music, you are touched by love in a very pure way."

Amelia is a short drive off I-95 north of Jacksonville International Airport. Or tie up your boat in the marina, bike through town, browse through quaint shops, or fill the afternoon with golf. Dine on fresh seafood and watch the sunset turn the Amelia River to gold—all before curtain.

THE THIRD SEASON of the Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival, May 30-June 20, will begin with an American tradition, a Sunday concert in the park. Gather around the gazebo where the Jacksonville Brass and WJCT Public Broadcasting will kick off Festival 2004. Bring your lawn chairs, picnic baskets and children for a relaxing musical afternoon with friends.

Festival Artistic Director Christopher Rex has again designed an eclectic musical calendar that will excite, inspire, and transport listeners. The mix of new stars and returning favorites continues. This year, guests will be treated to a musician who has performed for presidents and kings. We welcome classical guitarist Pepe Romero and "Guitara Romantica" on May 31 at First Baptist Church.

CECILIA ARZEWESKI, violin. Concertmaster of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra since 1990, Arzeweski has appeared as soloist with the Cleveland Orchestra and the Boston Pops, played regularly in chamber music concerts throughout New England and made her New York solo debut in Carnegie Hall. She has also appeared in concerts with the Georgia Chamber Players and in recitals throughout Europe. Prior to coming to Atlanta, Arzeweski was assistant concertmaster with the Boston Symphony and associate concertmaster of the Cleveland Orchestra.



RACHEL BARTON, violin. Barton began violin studies at age three and made her professional debut four years later. Her latest recording of the Brahms and Joachim Concertos, in collaboration with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and conductor Carlos Kalmar, was released in June 2003 to widespread acclaim. She has been featured on CBS *Sunday Morning*, has twice appeared on the *Today Show*, and was named 2003 "Classical Entertainer of the Year" at the 22nd Annual Chicago Music Awards.



WILLIAM BARTON, didgeridoo. Born in Mt. Isa in northwestern Queensland, Australia, Barton learned the didgeridoo from the elders of the Kalkadunga Tribe. Today, he is widely recognized as one of Australia's finest traditional players, teachers and composers for the didgeridoo. In 2005, he is scheduled to debut with the London Philharmonic Orchestra.

RHONDA CASSANO, flute. A member of the Jacksonville Symphony, Cassano is on the faculty at the University of North Florida. She performs

with the St. John Chamber Players, Synergy, and St. Mark's Bach Ensemble, all of which she co-founded with her husband, Philip Pan.



VICTORIA CHIANG, viola. Formerly a faculty member at the Juilliard School and the Hartt School of Music, Chiang is one of the founding members of the Aspen Ensemble and is currently on the artist/faculty of the Peabody Conservatory of Music and the Aspen Music Festival.



ROBERTO DIAZ, viola. Principal violist of The Philadelphia Orchestra and a member of the faculty of the Curtis Institute of Music. As a member of the Diaz Trio, he has performed throughout the United States, Canada, Europe, Mexico and Chile.



DEBORAH DUNHAM, bass. A doctoral student at Rice University's Shepherd School of Music, she has performed at Aspen, Tanglewood, The Grand Teton Festival, Rochester Philharmonic, Boston Symphony Orchestras, Houston Symphony and Ballet Orchestras.



JAMES DUNHAM, viola. Professor of Violin at Rice University's Shepherd School of Music, he has served as principal violist of the San Diego Mainly Mozart Festival for 10 seasons and this summer he celebrates his eighth year as violist of the Festival der Zukunft in Ernen, Switzerland.



EROICA TRIO, Erika Nickrenz, piano; Adela Peña, violin; Sara Sant' Ambrogio, cello. The Trio won the prestigious Naumburg Award, debuted in Lincoln Center and Carnegie Hall, and has toured the United States, Europe and Asia. Award-winning records, numerous television appearances including ABC's *The View*, CNN's *Showbiz Today*, CBS's *The Morning Show* and PBS' special documentary *Eroica!* and multiple magazine features underscore their professional magic.



GARY GRAFFMAN, piano. He received his piano training at the Curtis Institute of Music, making his professional debut with the Philadelphia Orchestra, under the direction

of conductor Eugene Ormandy. When an injury to his right hand changed his focus from the stage to the classroom, he returned to the Curtis Institute of Music, in 1995, assumed the presidency. In 1993, he returned to the stage, joining Andre Previn and the Curtis Institute's Symphony Orchestra to perform Ned Rorem's Piano Concerto No. 4, written specifically for the left hand.



GUARNERI STRING QUARTET, Arnold Steinhardt, violin; John Dalley, violin; Michael Tree, viola; Peter Wiley, cello. This season finds them celebrating their 40th anniversary. Featured on television and radio, in documentaries and educational presentations including a full-length, Academy-Award-winning documentary film, the Guarneri has been the subject of books and became the only quartet to receive the Award of Merit from the Association of Performing Arts Presenters in New York City. In January 2004, they received the Chamber Music America's highest honor, the Richard J. Bogomolny National Service Award, given annually to an individual or ensemble for a lifetime of service and achievement in the field.



HILARY HAHN, violin. Grammy Award-winner Hilary Hahn has been named "America's Best" young classical musician by *Time Magazine* in 2001. Her current schedule includes recital debuts at the Kennedy Center in Washington, DC, Disney Hall in Los Angeles, and the Kimmel Center in Philadelphia; a debut tour with the New Zealand Symphony; appearances and recordings with the London Symphony Orchestra; subscription concerts with the symphony orchestras of Cincinnati, Indianapolis, Montreal, Toronto, and Hong Kong; and concerts in Germany, the Netherlands, Luxembourg, Switzerland and Spain. Since 1997, she has recorded six classical albums—four were bestsellers and her 2001 recording of the concertos of Brahms and Stravinsky was her Grammy Award winner.



LYNN HARRELL, cello. A consummate soloist, chamber musician, recitalist, conductor and teacher, Harrell's work in America, Europe and Asia has placed him in the highest echelon of today's performing artists. In recent seasons, he has made guest appearances with the Philadelphia Orchestra; the Boston, Chicago and Dallas Symphonies; and the Israel, London and Los

Angeles Philharmonics. Over the years, Harrell has produced an extensive discography of over 30 recordings—two of which, with Itzak Perlman and Vladimir Ashkenazy, won Grammy Awards.



DENNIS HUNSICKER, bandoneon. Studied at the Endpaper Conservatory of Music. He toured the United States and Europe as a member of Cinclant (NATO) Band. He is a member of the Palm Court Society Orchestra, La Dolce Vita, and the River City Continentals in Jacksonville.

JACKSONVILLE BRASS QUINTET. Cliff Newton, trumpet; Charles Mattiesen, trumpet; Aaron Brask, horn; Jeff Peterson, trombone; James Jenkins, tuba. The Jacksonville Brass Quintet was formed in 1978 to perform brass ensemble concerts in the North Florida area.



KIM KASHKASHIAN, viola. Kashkashian has performed with the Tokyo, Guarneri and Galimir Quartets; toured with a quartet composed of violinists Gidon Kremer and Daniel Phillips and cellist Yo-Yo Ma; and received the 2001 Cannes Classical Award for a recording by a soloist with orchestra.



DAVID KIM, violin. Concertmaster of the Philadelphia Orchestra since 1999, Kim has been featured in television network specials, on NPR and in *Newsweek* magazine. He is founder and artistic director of the Kingston Chamber Music Festival at the University of Rhode Island and has founded an annual outreach program. He conducts master classes at the Manhattan School of Music and the Curtis Institute.



ALEXEI KUZNETSOFF, piano. Mr. Kuznetsoff and his wife Valentina Lisitsa virtually exploded onto the American musical scene in their formal U. S. debut in Chicago. Their performance garnered the following praise from the *Chicago Tribune's* music critic, John von Rhein: "I cannot recall when I have heard a more exciting or more accomplished two-piano team. They have the colossal technique and temperament you associated with pianists of the Russian school. They have a virtually flawless ensem-

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ble, the kind most duos take years to achieve, if they are ever so fortunate."



RUTH LAREDO, piano. "America's First Lady of the Piano," has performed at Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, Kennedy Center, the Library of Congress and the White House. A three-time Grammy Award nominee, and *Record World Magazine's* "Best Keyboard Artist," her extensive tour of Russia and the Ukraine formed part of a profile about her on *CBS Sunday Morning*. She is a frequent guest on WQXR and NPR's *Morning Edition*, and the Metropolitan Museum of Art "Concerts with Commentary."



SUZANNE LEFEVRE, viola. A resident of Antwerp, Belgium, LeFevre's career began as principal viola of the Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra. She has played with the Netherlands Philharmonic Orchestra, Milwaukee Symphony Orchestras, Chicago Sinfonietta, and New Haven Symphony. For eight years, she has been co-principal viola at the Colorado Music Festival.



HYO-SUN LIM, piano. Studied at the Curtis Institute of Music where she holds the Curtis/Ralph Berkowitz Fellowship. She performed in concert with Guarneri String Quartet first violinist Arnold Steinhardt in Boston and Philadelphia and was invited to participate in the TCU/Cliburn Institute in Texas, the Mozarteum Institute in Salzburg, Austria, and the Cervo Music Festival in Italy.



CHO-LIANG LIN, violin. Cho-Liang is known internationally for the beauty of his sound, technical mastery and superb musical interpretation, and has appeared with major orchestras and renowned recital and chamber music series. His recordings include winners of Gramophone awards, Grammy nominations and Stereo Review "Record-of-the-Year" honors. Born in Taiwan, Cho-Liang arrived in New York at the age of 15 and was enrolled in The Juilliard School immediately following his audition. Today, he is member of the Juilliard faculty.



VALENTINA LISITSA, piano. Ukrainian born pianist Valentina Lisitsa has captured the attention of audiences throughout the world with her stunning virtuosity and unequalled sense of lyricism in an already formidable repertoire of romantic and late classical pieces. Ms. Lisitsa and Mr. Kuznetsoff won prizes in the Murray Dranoff

Two Pianos Competition, Concertina Prague, and the Lysenko Piano Competition, the Paris Chamber Music Competition. Ms. Lisitsa was the subject of a television program entitled "Valentina in Miami," a one hour music special produced by Miami's PBS affiliate and has been featured in a segment of the *CBS Sunday Morning*. Ms. Lisitsa returns to the Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival for her third season.



ROBERT McDUFFIE, violin. Solo appearances include New York and Los Angeles Philharmonics, the Chicago, San Francisco, Montreal, and Toronto Symphonies; the Philadelphia, Cleveland, and Minnesota Orchestras; the Leipzig Gewandhaus Orchestra; the North German and Frankfort Radio Orchestras; the Deutsche Kammerphilharmonie Bremen; Orchestra del Teatro alla Scala; Santa Cecilia Orchestra of Rome; and all of the major orchestras of Australia. A Grammy-nominated recording artist, he has been profiled on NBC's *Today Show*, PBS's *Charlie Rose*, A&E's *Breakfast with the Arts*, in the *New York Times* and *Wall Street Journal*.



BETH NEWDOME, violin. Beth Newdome recently joined Florida State University as Assistant Professor of Violin after serving as the Associate Concertmaster of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra. A member of the Georgia Chamber Players, the players debuted at Carnegie's Weill Recital Hall in November 2001.



HELEN NIGHTENGALE, violin. Founder of the Kandinsky String Trio, Nightengale has been concertmaster of the London Symphony Orchestra, the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra, the Los Angeles Opera and the Lower State Opera in Hannover, Germany.



ELMAR OLIVEIRA, violin. Oliveira is the only American violinist to win the Gold Medal at Moscow's Tchaikovsky International Competition and the first violinist to receive the Avery Fisher Prize. Other honors include first prize at the Naumburg International Competition and the G.B.Dealey Competition. A prodigious recording artist, Oliveira is a two-time Grammy nominee.



STANFORD OLSEN, tenor. Olsen has performed with the Metropolitan Opera, the Mostly Mozart Festival, Tanglewood, the Salzburg Festival, Ravinia, and the

Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival.



PHILIP PAN, violin. Currently in his 20th season as concertmaster of the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra, Pan has performed at Alice Tully Hall, the Aspen Music Festival and in venues throughout the Southeast. With his wife, flutist Rhonda Cassano, he founded the Saint Johns Chamber Players and the "Bach is Back" series. Synergy, their most recent creation, will be the ensemble-in-residence of the Florida Ballet.



WILLIAM PREUCIL, violin. Since 1994, Preucil has been concertmaster of the Cleveland Orchestra. Actively involved as an educator, Preucil is Distinguished Professor of Violin at the Cleveland Institute of Music and Artist-in-Residence at the University of Maryland School of Music.



ELIZABETH PRIDGEN, piano. A Resident Young Artist at the 2003 Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival, Pridgen received a master's degree from the Juilliard School. Performances include New York, Atlanta, and Curacao, Netherlands Antilles.



WILLIAM PU, violin. Born in China, Pu graduated from the Shanghai Conservatory of Music, he earned a master's degree from the University of Houston. After 12 seasons with the Houston Symphony Orchestra as assistant concertmaster, Pu is the associate concertmaster of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra.



BJORN RANHEIM, cello. A graduate of the Cleveland Institute of Music, Ranheim has held principal and assistant principal cello positions with the New World Symphony, the National Repertory Orchestra, the Colorado Music Festival, Aspen Festival Orchestra and Quebec City's Le Violons du Roy.



WILLIAM RANSOM, piano. Currently head of the piano faculty at Emory University, his performances have been broadcast on NPR and television in the United States, Japan, Korea, Argentina and Poland. CHRISTOPHER REX, cello. Christopher Rex joined the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra as Principal Cello in 1979, the same year in which he became the first cellist ever to win the string prize in the biennial Young Artists Competition of the National Federation of Music Clubs. He has appeared as recitalist and chamber musician across the nation. He was a member of the Philadelphia Orchestra under director Eugene Ormandy for seven seasons, and is a founding member of the Georgian Chamber Players. 

DONALD RUNNICLES, conductor, piano. One of his generation's most distinguished conductors of both operatic and symphonic works, Runnicles is the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra's principal guest conductor, music director of the San Francisco Opera and principal conductor of the Orchestra of St. Luke's in New York. In demand abroad as well as at home, he regularly conducts at the Bayreuth Festival, the Edinburgh Festival, La Scala, the Metropolitan Opera, the Paris National Opera and the Salzburg Festival. This past March he

made his Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra debut with programs that will travel to Budapest, Hungary and cities in Austria.



ELIZABETH PRIOR RUNNICLES, viola. Educated in South Africa and at the Music Conservatory in Freiburg, Germany, Runnicles has played with the San Francisco Ballet and Symphony Orchestra, was principal viola with the California Symphony, and is presently assistant principal with the Marin Symphony. In chamber music, she is a founding member of the Broderick Ensemble, Marin Harp Trio and "Friends of Donald

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Runnicles" Chamber Music Series. Last season, she appeared at the Grand Tetons Music Festival and with the Sun Valley Summer Symphony.



GIL SHAHAM, violin. Educated in Israel, Shaham began violin studies at age 7. He debuted with the Jerusalem Symphony and the Israel Philharmonic. A graduate of Juilliard and Columbia University, he is recognized as one of today's most virtuosic and engaging classical artists. Shaham has won a Grammy Award for his recital album *American Scenes* with pianist Andre Previn.



ORLI SHAHAM, piano. At the age of 5, she was awarded her first scholarship from the America-Israel Cultural Foundation. At 8, she was accepted at The Juilliard School as a scholarship student. She appeared on Robert Kapilow's "What Makes it Great?" series in New York and Boston and in 2002 was an artist-in-residence on NPR's *Performance Today*.

RYAN SIMMONS, bassoon. A graduate of The Curtis Institute of Music, Simmons is the principal bassoonist of the Jacksonville Symphony. His career included associate principal of the Los Angeles Philharmonic, acting principal of the San Diego Symphony, and as a substitute with the Philadelphia Orchestra, National Symphony Orchestra, New World Symphony, Orquesta Sinfonica de Tenerife, Philadelphia Orchestra Wind Quartet, and the Moscow Radio Orchestra.



ARNOLD STEINHARDT, violin, viola. In addition to being first violinist of the internationally acclaimed Guarneri String Quartet, Steinhardt is professor of violin at the University of Maryland, Rutgers University, and The Curtis Institute of Music. He has recorded extensively and is the author of numerous articles for Chamber Music America and Keynote. His first book, *Indivisible by Four, a String Quartet in Pursuit of Harmony* was published in 1998.



TOKYO STRING QUARTET, Martin Beaver, violin; Kikuei Ideda, violin; Kazuhide Isomura, viola; Clive Greensmith, cello. Founded more than 30 years ago at The Juilliard School of Music, the members have served on the faculty of the Yale School of Music since 1976 as quartet-in-residence. The quartet has released more than 30 landmark recordings, capturing numerous honors and Grammy nominations, and has been featured on such widely-watched television programs as *Sesame Street*, *CBS Sunday Morning*, PBS's *Great Performances*, and CNN's *This Morning*.



SUSAN WELTY, horn. While earning her BM degree in music performance from Northwestern University, Welty was a member of the Civic Orchestra of Chicago and a founding member of the Alice Millar Brass Ensemble. After graduation, she joined the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, where she is currently associate principal hornist. She was a featured guest artist at the International Horn Workshop held at the University of Georgia.

JOHN WIELAND, bass. Prior to becoming principal bass of the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra, Wieland held the position with the Virginia Symphony, the Oklahoma Symphony, and the Orquesta Sinfonica de Minería in Mexico City. Wieland is a member of the Colorado Philharmonic, the Aspen Festival Orchestra, Colorado Music Festival and an instructor of double bass at Stetson University in DeLand, Florida.



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
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




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A few words with Artistic Director Christopher Rex



"THE MUSIC IS AS GOOD as any you are going to hear anywhere in the world," says Christopher Rex, artistic director of the Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival and a founding member of its board of directors. Rex isn't being boastful or just trying to sell tickets to the event he helped launch three years ago. Good music played by world-class musicians is something he knows well, having served as principal cello of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra for the past 23 years. His career as a recitalist and chamber musician includes performing with the New York Philharmonic's European tour. And he is a founding member of the Georgian Chamber Players, an ensemble that appeared in concert in Carnegie Hall in November 2002.

Rex's love of classical performance no doubt drove him to help create an annual festival that celebrates chamber music. But it was good fortune and the beach that brought him to Amelia Island about ten years ago. After years of vacationing on Hilton Head Island, South Carolina, a desire for a change of scenery resulted in a stay at The Ritz-Carlton, Amelia Island. That was all it took. A few return trips and the purchase of a condominium ensued, and now he and his family consider the island a second home.

Classical musicians often operate as freelance artists, seeking employment as solo players or with orchestras or smaller musical groups. Some of the most talented and ambitious players go one step further by creating opportunities to perform. As Rex and his family settled into their new home, the acclaimed cellist began to suspect Amelia Island was an environment that could embrace a new music festival. "I felt the demographics of the residents and the visitors to the island made this a good market for a festival," he recalls. To better judge the local reception to chamber music, Rex staged two concerts at The Ritz-Carlton in December of 1999. The Christmastime concerts were a hit and a plan for a multi-day festival was soon in the works.

While only in its third year, few could question the festival's success. Sold-out shows are the norm, as are return perfor-



mances by the dozens of participating musicians, many of which are considered among the world's elite. Rex admits that he was cautiously optimistic about the festival's chances for success, particularly because the island's atmosphere would be readily embraced by the performers. "Fernandina cannot afford a museum with a Picasso or a Monet," Rex says. "But we can provide a festival that attracts the best musician playing today."

"Chamber music represents the quintessential classical music experience," he continues. "It was originally intended as music for a small room. Composers would make it for themselves and their friends."

According to Rex, this kind of intimate performance venue resulted in two significant musical adaptations from classical composers. First, because a parlor simply could not hold all the players in a typical orchestra, the music created was designed to complement the talents of just a handful of musicians and their instruments. And, perhaps even more noteworthy, the music was of a more personal nature. It was not commissioned by a wealthy patron or intended to be performed in grand concert halls. "The music was a personal statement from the composer," Rex says. "If you make a speech from a stage to an audience, you speak in a certain way. Compare that to if you are in a room talking with friends. It's just a completely different experience." It's an experience that more and more Northeast Floridians seem eager to enjoy. ♦



What is chamber music? There are many definitions, but the most common is by Horner (1968). He says that "Chamber music...as letters written in the longest form, is the shortest form of music. It is a group of four to eight musicians who play together in a part, and on which the

Chamber music was developed in the 17th century in Paris and Germany. It was first used in small ensembles, mostly for friends and family. It was later adopted by nobility and the upper class.

The main purpose of chamber music is to bring people together in a more intimate setting. In chamber music, you generally do not know who is playing because each player has their own unique style.

Chamber Music Genres

What have the piano quartets done for creating the Pianoforte? A Piano Trio, a Quartet, a Quintet, a Sextet, a Septet, and so on. These are the main genres in chamber music.

What is the difference between the violin and cello? Both are bowed instruments, but they are played differently. The violin uses a bow and the cello uses a bow.

The strings in a chamber ensemble consist of violins, viola, cellos, and double bass.

A Very Short Course in Chamber Music

CHAMBER MUSIC IS INSTRUMENTAL music written for a small ensemble, usually two to ten players, to be performed in a private home or small hall for friends and music lovers. From its beginnings in 1750 as an aristocratic pastime, chamber music became a popular focus for middle-class social gatherings. Public performances began in the 19th century.

Written principally for string quartets (two violins, a viola and a cello), chamber music ensemble size can vary from a duet to a quintet of four stringed instruments plus a piano or wind instrument. Contemporary idioms and techniques of the 20th Century found expression in the works of Debussy and Ravel, Bartók, Schüenberg, Webern, Shostakovich, and others. Modern ensembles of varying size can include voice, harp, guitar, wind and even percussion instruments.

From small beginnings, this popular genre grew to fill ever-bigger concert halls. But the small chamber remained its true home. For in this intimate space, the music becomes a conversation between the composer, the artists, the instruments, and the listeners.

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
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
