


Counting Down to Festival 2005



It's May 29, a sunny Sunday afternoon at 2 PM in Central Park. Everyone is gathered around the gazebo in anticipation. Why? It's the debut of the Amelia Pops String Quartet. It's the first concert of the Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival's fourth season, and everyone's invited.

Many first-time festival attendees are awestruck by the array of celebrated musicians, the unusual venues, and the enthusiastic audience participation. In the months leading up to the festival, island residents freely contribute their time and talents. The excitement builds as the musicians arrive, and then something magical happens—a convergence of deep personal commitment and emotional passion for music is experienced by all—and a music festival is created anew.

Amelia Island is very much an internationally diverse community. Our globe-trotting residents are no strangers to phenomenal symphonies and festivals, whether here or abroad. Yet each year they participate in the festival's creation, attend events, and contribute financial support.

All agree on one thing: It couldn't be done

without Artistic Director Christopher Rex. He continues to deliver top chamber festival events attracting internationally-acclaimed musicians—the best in the world. New introductions for 2005 include Peter Schickele, Horacio Gutiérrez, the Ritz Chamber Players, and the Appalachia Waltz Trio.

Professor Peter Schickele is internationally recognized as a musician and composer, aka P.D.Q. Bach. His Beer and G-String series at the Palace Saloon will include four original compositions, including: *Schleptet*, *Sonata for Viola—Four Hands*, and *Sonata Enamerata*.

Jacksonville favorites, the Ritz Chamber Players, is an ensemble of internationally accomplished black musicians. They recently

performed at Carnegie Hall to a sold-out audience and will debut with the Festival June 2. A highlight of the evening will be the performance of two works by William Grant Still.

Then there are pianists Horacio Gutiérrez and Orli Shaham—so many highlights. Beethoven's String Quartet, Op. 135 and the Takács String Quartet, Bach's Brandenburg Concerto No. 3 in G, Mendelssohn's Trio for Violin, Cello and Piano in C minor, Op. 66 with Hilary Hahn, Faure, Haydn, Paganini, Saint-Saens, Mozart, Messiaen, Schumann, Mozart, and on it goes.

This year's festival calendar holds many surprises. Won't you join us for this year's internationally acclaimed musicians and community and catch the Island fever!

Brice Andrus, horn On the faculty of Emory University, Andrus is a member of the Emory Chamber Music Society. He recorded the Horn Trio by Johannes Brahms and also performed on several recordings featuring the music of Atlanta composer Charles Knox.



Laura Ardan, clarinet

Principal clarinet for the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, Ardan has been associated with the Lincoln Center Institute, Metropolitan Opera Orchestra, Emory Chamber Music Society, Tanglewood, Marlboro and Mostly Mozart Festivals. She is on the faculty of Emory.



Rachel Barton Pine, violin

An acclaimed soloist on world stages and recipient of numerous awards, the Music Institute of Chicago has named the "Rachel Barton Violin Chair" in her honor. In January 2005, WFMT in Chicago, aired three live performances of Beethoven. Her latest recording, Solo Baroque, was released in 2004. She has been featured on NPR's *Performance Today*, CBS's *Sunday Morning*, and NBC's *Today*.



Rhonda Cassano, flute A Jacksonville Symphony member, Cassano is on the faculty at the University of North Florida. She performs with the St. John Chamber Players, Synergy, and St. Mark's Bach Ensemble, all ensembles she co-founded with her husband, Philip Pan.



Martin Chalifour, violin Canadian-born Chalifour has been the principal concertmaster of the Los Angeles Philharmonic since 1995, and performs in concert halls around the world. Chalifour graduated from the Montreal Conservatory and studied at the Curtis Institute of Music. He is a professor at the Thornton School of Music, USC.



Victoria Chiang, viola Formerly a faculty member at the Juilliard School and the Hartt School of Music, Chiang is a founding member of the

Aspen Ensemble and is on the artist/faculty of the Peabody Conservatory of Music and the Aspen Music Festival.



Deborah Dunham, bass

Currently pursuing doctoral studies at Rice University's Shepherd School of Music, Dunham performs at Aspen, Tanglewood, Grand Teton Festival, Mainly Mozart, Arizona Chamber Music Festival, and in the Swiss Festival der Zukunft. She has appeared with the Rochester Philharmonic, Boston Symphony and Pops, Houston Symphony and Ballet Orchestras, and the Honolulu Symphony.



James Dunham, viola

Professor of Viola at Rice University's Shepherd School of Music, Dunham is active internationally as a recitalist. An advocate of new music, he has worked with prominent composers and as a competition jurist. He has served as principal violist of the Mainly Mozart Festival for ten seasons. This summer he celebrates his eighth year as violist of the Festival der Zukunft in Ernen, Switzerland.



Guarneri String Quartet:

Arnold Steinhardt, violin; John Dalley, violin; Michael Tree, viola; Peter Wiley, cello. Guarneri celebrates their 40th anniversary, their annual Metropolitan Museum of Art concert series, and their well-known series and residency at the University of Maryland. Featured on television and radio, in documentaries and educational presentations including a full-length, Academy-Award-winning documentary film, the Guarneri has been the subject of books and became the only quartet to receive the Award of Merit from the Association of Performing Arts Presenters in New York City. In January 2004, they received the Chamber Music America's highest honor, the Richard J. Bogomolny National Service Award, given annually to an individual or ensemble for a lifetime of service and achievement in the field. In April 2005, one of the culminating events of the Guarneri's Anniversary was a performance in Lincoln Center's Alice Tully Hall, presented by the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center. In May of 2005, Guarneri will receive the Ford

Honors Award from the University Musical Society of the University of Michigan.



Horacio Gutiérrez, piano

Born in Havana, Cuba, Horacio Gutiérrez appeared at the age of eleven as guest soloist with the Havana Symphony. He became an American citizen in 1967. He debuted in 1970 with Zubin Mehta and the Los Angeles Philharmonic. Gutiérrez appears with the world's greatest orchestras and annual summer festivals. Recent recitals include Amsterdam's Concertgebouw, Berlin's Philharmonie, the Schleswig-Holstein Festival, New York's Carnegie Hall and Avery Fisher Hall, as well as venues in Los Angeles, Boston, Chicago, San Francisco and Cleveland.



Hilary Hahn, violin

Grammy Award-winning Hilary Hahn appears with the world's great orchestras in Europe, Asia and North America and was named "America's Best" young classical musician by *Time Magazine* in 2001. Her schedule includes recital debuts at the Kennedy Center in Washington, DC, Disney Hall in Los Angeles, and the Kimmel Center in Philadelphia; a debut tour with the New Zealand Symphony; appearances and recordings with the London Symphony Orchestra; subscription concerts with the symphony orchestras of Cincinnati, Indianapolis, Montreal, Toronto, and Hong Kong; and concerts in Germany, the Netherlands, Luxembourg, Switzerland and Spain. Since 1997, she has recorded six classical albums—four were bestsellers and her 2001 recording of the concertos of Brahms and Stravinsky was her Grammy Award winner.



Lynn Harrell, cello

A consummate soloist, chamber musician, recitalist, conductor and educator, Harrell's work in America, Europe and Asia has placed him in the highest echelon of today's performing artists. In recent seasons, he has made guest appearances with the Philadelphia Orchestra; the Boston, Chicago and Dallas Symphonies; and with the Israel, London, Hong Kong, Los Angeles and Royal Philharmonics. He appeared at the Vatican's first commemoration of the Holocaust. Harrell has produced a discography of over 30 recordings, two of which, with Itzak Perlman and Vladimir Ashkenazy, won Grammy Awards.

FESTIVAL PERFORMERS



James Jenkins, tuba Principal tubist with the Jacksonville Symphony since 1995, Jenkins is the artistic personnel manager with the Eastern Music Festival. An artist with the Naples Philharmonic and Alabama Symphony, he co-founded the New Brass Ensemble, an ensemble of top African-American classical musicians. He is the founder of Body & Soul—The Art of Healing, an innovative program pairing artists with patients in area health care facilities.



Alexei Kuznetsoff, pianist Kuznetsoff and his wife Valentina Lisitsa virtually exploded onto the American musical scene in their formal U.S. debut in Chicago. Their performance garnered the following praise from the *Chicago Tribune's* music critic, John von Rhein: "I cannot recall when I have heard a more exciting or more accomplished two-piano team. They have the colossal technique and temperament you associate with pianists of the Russian school. They have a virtually flawless ensemble, the kind most duos take years to achieve, if they are ever so fortunate."



Danny Laufer, cellist Born in Israel, and Associate Principal Cellist of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra since 1991, Laufer began studying cello at age 11 with his father, Wolfgang Laufer.

A founding member of the Emory Chamber Music Society, he performs in recitals and chamber ensembles.



Suzanne LeFevre, viola LeFevre's career began as principal violist with the Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra, then assistant principal viola with the Charlotte Symphony. She has played with the Netherlands Philharmonic Orchestra, Milwaukee Symphony and Ballet Orchestras, Chicago Sinfonietta, and New Haven Symphony. A past member of the Assai Quartet, LeFevre is an active chamber musician performing in the U.S. and Europe.



Cho-Liang Lin, violin Lin is known internationally for the beauty of his sound, technical mastery and superb musical interpretation. *Musical America* named

Lin the 2000 Instrumentalist of the Year. Lin founded the Taipei International Music Festival in 1997, is on the faculty of Juilliard, and is the artistic director of SummerFest La Jolla. He has appeared with major orchestras and in renowned recital and chamber music series around the world. His recordings include winners of Gramophone awards, Grammy nominations and *Stereo Review* Record-of-the-Year honors.



Valentina Lisitsa, piano Ukrainian born pianist Valentina Lisitsa has captured the attention of audiences throughout the world with her stunning virtuosity and unequaled sense of lyricism. Lisitsa, in duo with husband Alexei Kuznetsoff, won prizes in the Murray Dranoff Two Pianos Competition, Concertina Prague, and the Lysenko Piano Competition, the Paris Chamber Music Competition. On tour with the Orchestra National de France in 1992, she performed the Poulenc Concerto for Two Pianos with Kuznetsoff at Lincoln Center's Avery Fisher Hall. She has toured with the Russian State Symphony Orchestra, in Europe with the Stuttgart Symphony Orchestra, and held solo and chamber music recitals in Milan, Vienna, Amsterdam, Glasgow, New York, Chicago, Miami and San Diego. Lisitsa was the subject of a television program entitled "Valentina in Miami," produced by Miami's PBS affiliate, and has been featured on the CBS News program *Sunday Morning*. Her discography consists of seven recordings. She can be heard on the Audiofon label. Lisitsa returns to the Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival for her fourth season.



Robert McDuffie, violin A soloist with major world orchestras including the New York and Los Angeles Philharmonics, the Chicago, San Francisco, Montreal and Toronto Symphonies; the Philadelphia, Cleveland and Minnesota Orchestras; the Leipzig Gewandhaus Orchestra; the North German and Frankfort Radio Orchestras; the Deutsche Kammerphilharmonie Bremen; Orchestra del Teatro alla Scala; Santa Cecilia Orchestra of Rome, Concertgebouw in Amsterdam, Noord Nederlands Orkest; and the major orchestras of Australia. A Grammy-nominated recording artist, McDuffie has been profiled on NBC, CBS, PBS, A&E, in the *New York Times* and *Wall Street Journal*, and has served as a commentator on NPR. He is the co-founder and artistic director

of The Rome Chamber Music Festival at Villa Aurelia, and a Distinguished University Professor of Music at Mercer University.



Claudia Minch, oboe and English horn Member of the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra since 1979 and a graduate with Honors of the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston, Minch performs locally, teaches, and makes oboe and English horn reeds.



Beth Newdome, violin After 17 years in association with major symphony orchestras, Newdome joined the faculty at Florida State University in 2002 as an assistant professor of violin. She is a member of the Georgian Chamber Players, the Inman Piano Trio, and serves on the faculty at the Aspen Music Festival and School.



Helen Nightengale, violin Founder of the Kandinsky String Trio, Nightengale has been concertmaster of the London Symphony Orchestra, the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra, the Los Angeles Opera, and the Lower State Opera in Hannover, Germany. Engagements have included a U.S. State Department tour in Central America, performances with the Los Angeles Chamber, Chicago Lyric, Lower Saxony and Lower Rhine Orchestras.



Carl Nitchie, bassoon Nitchie is principal bassoonist with the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, teaches at Emory University, and is a coach for the Atlanta Youth Symphony.



Mark O'Connor, violinist/composer/fiddler O'Connor, recognized as one of the most gifted contemporary composers in America, has appeared at the White House, Atlanta Olympic Games, and on major network shows. The *New York Times* calls O'Connor "one of the most spectacular journeys in recent American music." O'Connor is a violinist and a composer credited with creating a new brand of American classical music, a fusion born from his studies with Texas fiddler Benny Thomasson and French jazz violinist Stephane Grappelli. In

2002, he formed the Appalachia Waltz Trio, featuring Juilliard graduates cellist Natalie Haas and violist Carol Cook. The Trio performs repertoire created by O'Connor for his "Appalachia Waltz" and "Appalachian Journey" recording projects.



Elmar Oliveira, violin Oliveira is the only American violinist to win the Gold Medal at Moscow's Tchaikovsky International Competition, and the first violinist to receive the Avery Fisher Prize. Other honors include first prize at the Naumburg International Competition and the G.B. Dealey Competition. His rigorous itinerary includes appearances with the world's greatest orchestras, and service on the juries of some of the most prestigious violin competitions. A prodigious recording artist, Oliveira is a two-time Grammy nominee.



Eric Olson, oboe A graduate of Northwestern University, Olson is the Principle Oboist for the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra. He has appeared with the Baltimore and Chicago Orchestras, as well as in national festivals.



Philip Pan, violin Pan celebrates his twentieth season as concertmaster of the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra. Performance venues include Alice Tully Hall, Aspen Music Festival, Boston Pops and many others. He is a co-founder with wife, JSO flutist Rhonda Cassano, of Synergy, the St. Johns Chamber Players and the St. Mark's Bach Ensemble. Pan is a graduate of the Juilliard School of Music, where he studied with Dorothy DeLay.



Elizabeth Pridgen, piano An AICMF Resident Young Artist in 2003, Pridgen has added a master's degree from Juilliard School to her bachelor's degree from the Peabody Conservatory. She performed with Yo-Yo Ma and the Silk Road Ensemble in 2004, at Alice Tully Hall, the DACOR Bacon House in Washington, DC, and Tanglewood.



William Pu, violin Born in China, Pu graduated from the Shanghai Conservatory of Music and earned a master's degree at the University of Houston. After 12 seasons with the Houston Symphony Orchestra as assistant concertmaster, Pu is the associate concertmaster of the

Atlanta Symphony Orchestra.



Kevin Reid, horn Principal Horn with the Jacksonville Symphony, Reid has been with the Symphony since 1998. He is a graduate of Florida State University and Southern Methodist University. He appears with national symphonies and summer festivals.



Charles Rex, violin A distinguished Florida State University Alumnus, Rex made his debut with the Florida Symphony at age 13, studied with Richard Burgin at Florida State University, and played with the Philadelphia Orchestra for eight seasons before joining the New York Philharmonic as associate concertmaster.



Christopher Rex, cello Principal cello of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra for the past 26 years, Rex is artistic director of the Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival and is a founding member of its board of directors. His career as a recitalist and chamber musician includes performing with the Philadelphia Orchestra and the New York Philharmonic's European tour. He is a founding member of the Georgian Chamber Players. With his brother, Charles Rex, he premiered a new double concerto for violin, cello and orchestra by Stephen Paulus in Lincoln Center with Kurt Masur and the New York Philharmonic. In 2001, the brothers presented a tribute to their father, Charles Gordon Rex, Sr., in Carnegie's Weill Recital Hall. Rex performed in Carnegie Hall in November 2002, where he appeared with the Georgian Chamber Players and Ukrainian pianist Valentina Lisitsa. Rex opened the 2004-2005 season of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra as soloist in the tone poem "Don Quixote" by Richard Strauss. In July 2005, Rex begins a three year-appointment to the Chamber Music America Board of Directors.



The Ritz Chamber Players The Ritz Chamber Players appearing with the AICMF are Alison Buchanan, soprano; Ann Hobson Pilot, harp; Damarre McGill, flute; Tai Murray, violin; Terrance Wilson, piano; and Terrance Patterson, Players founder and artistic director, clarinet. Based in Jacksonville, the Players are the nation's first and only chamber music ensemble of classically trained black musicians. All critically acclaimed musicians, they perform a wide range of compositions from Bach, Beethoven,

Mendelssohn and Tchaikovsky to today's leading black composers Singleton, Walker, Perkinson and Bonds. Graduates of Juilliard, Oberlin, Curtis, and Peabody, and in their fourth season together, the Players debuted in Carnegie Hall in 2003. WNYC/BBC Music and NPR have aired their performances.



Sandra Robbins, viola A graduate of the Manhattan School of Music, Robbins has studied with the Budapest String Quartet and at Kneisel Hall. Currently a member of the American Composers Orchestra and the Westchester Philharmonic, she has taught viola and chamber music on the faculties of Cornell, SUNY Geneseo and Syracuse University.



Les Roettges, flute Principal flute of the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra, Roettges has been principal flutist for the Philharmonic Orchestra of Mexico City.



Peter Schickele Since 1965 "Professor" Schickele has kept audiences in stitches with his presentation of music by "P.D.Q. Bach." In addition to annual concerts in New York City, he has appeared with over 50 orchestras, ranging from the Boston Symphony, Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Cleveland Orchestra, the New York Philharmonic, the London Symphony Orchestra and the Los Angeles Philharmonic to the New York Pick-Up Ensemble. His self-contained show *The Intimate P. D. Q. Bach* (featuring the Semi-Pro Musica Antiqua) has played in cities and on campuses from Maine to California.
