Welcome to the 2009 Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival


Now in its eighth season, the Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival has grown in size and stature since its inception in 2002, and today it is one of the largest classical music events of its kind in the Southeast. Over 50 internationally renowned artists will present 18 performances from May 21 through June 14, including the last-ever performance of The Guarneri String Quartet on October 27. Scheduled to retire following this appearance, The Guarneri is universally acclaimed as one of the world's greatest chamber ensembles. October 27, 2009 will be remembered as an historic date for the world of chamber music.

The year 2009 marks the 200th anniversary of Felix Mendelssohn's birth and the 200th anniversary of Franz Josef Haydn's death, and a portion of our upcoming season will commemorate these giants of the music world. The world famous Juilliard String Quartet will perform a program of Mendelssohn, Haydn and Beethoven at the Amelia Plantation Chapel on May 23. On June 5, a chamber ensemble, including violinist Arnold Steinhardt of the Guarneri, will perform Haydn's "Seven Last Words of Christ" at St. Peter's Episcopal Church. This program of sacred music will include readings from local clergy. In addition, we will present a "Mendelssohn Celebration" at Prince of Peace Lutheran Church on June 6 featuring three internationally acclaimed artists: Lincoln Center's Anne-Marie McDermott, piano; Andres Diaz, cello; and Anne Akiko Meyers, violin.

Historic Fort Clinch, garrisoned during the Civil War and one of the nation's best preserved nineteenth century forts, will be the setting for Igor Stravinsky's "A Soldier's Tale" on June 9. The Palace Saloon will host fun and showy performances on May 21, June 4 and June 11. Our Beer and G Strings concerts at the Palace Saloon have ranked among our most popular offerings in past years, and we believe these three performances will sell out quickly.

Also highlighting our 2009 season will be a performance on May 31 by renowned pianist and Amelia Island favorite Valentina Lisitsa and acclaimed chamber music violinist Maria Bachmann at the Amelia Plantation Chapel. Capping our eighth season will be a performance on June 14 by The Eroica Trio at the Ritz Carlton Amelia Island in a program titled, "Night at the Opera—No Singers!" This program will feature the trio's own

commissioned arrangements of Gershwin's "Porgy and Bess" and Bernstein's "West Side Story."



We will continue reaching out to our community with four free concerts, including the "String Fling" concert in Central Park on May 24. As part of our education mission, we also will present several concerts by our Resident Fellowship Artists, composed of promising students from the nation's leading conservatories, who will coach an inter-generational string group and perform with the great artists that appear throughout the festival.

On behalf of our Board of Directors, I extend our warmest welcome to you. And now, sit back and enjoy some wonderful music.



Internationally acclaimed violinist Robert McDuffie has appeared as soloist with many of the major orchestras of the world, including the New York and Los Angeles Philharmonics; the Chicago, San Francisco, Houston, Utah, St. Louis, Montreal, and Toronto Symphonies; the Philadelphia, Cleveland, Minnesota and Leipzig Gewandhaus orchestras; the North German Radio and Frankfurt Radio Orchestras; the Deutsche Kammerphilharmonie Bremen; Orchestra del Teatro alla Scala; Santa Cecilia Orchestra of Rome; and all of the major orchestras of Australia. He returns to Rome each June as the co-founder and artistic director of The Rome Chamber Music Festival. McDuffie also is Distinguished University Professor of Music at Mercer University, where he heads The Robert McDuffie Center for Strings.

Cellist Christopher Rex, general and artistic director and founder of the Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival, is principal cello of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, a position he has held since 1979. Also in that year, he became the first cellist ever to win the string prize in the biennial Young Artists Competition of the National Federation of Music Clubs. Following his studies at the Curtis Institute of Music with Orlando Cole and at the Juilliard School with Leonard Rose, he was a member of the Philadelphia Orchestra under director Eugene Ormandy for seven seasons. An active recitalist and chamber musician at venues around the nation, Rex is a founding member of the Georgian Chamber Players, artistic director of the Madison Chamber Music Festival and serves on the board of directors of Chamber Music America.

Amy Schwartz Moretti is director of the Robert McDuffie Center for Strings at Mercer University. She made her Carnegie Hall concerto debut in 1998 and has performed extensively across the United States as a soloist and chamber musician. She is the former concertmaster of the Oregon Symphony and The Florida Orchestra. Ms. Moretti also helped establish and was first violinist of the Oregon Symphony String Quartet and co-founded the Bay Area Music Summer Chamber Workshop for young musicians in Florida, where she continues to serve as Artistic Director.

The Juilliard String Quartet has come to define the “American Sound” in string quartet and chamber repertoire. Since its inception in 1946, the Juilliard has been recognized for the boldness of its interpretation of the classics, with a tradition of championing the new. The group has played the world premieres of works by more than 60 American composers, as well as the American premieres of the six Bartók Quartets, Shostakovich’s Quartet No. 15, and Dutilleux’s “Ainsi la Nuit.” These premieres are in addition to thousands of performances of the great classics of Haydn, Mozart, Schubert, and Brahms; the complete Beethoven cycles; and the Juilliard’s own scoring of Bach’s Art of the Fugue. The Quartet also specializes in rescuing underperformed masterworks from obscurity and in mentoring the very best young chamber musicians. The Juilliard has been the Quartet in Residence at the Library of Congress for more than four decades.





Haydn's "The Seven Last Words of Christ" is being performed as part of our commemoration of the 200th anniversary of the death of Franz Joseph Haydn. This classical composition, which features seven meditations on the last words of Christ, was commissioned in 1787 for the Good Friday service at the Grotto Santa Cueva near Cádiz in southern Spain. The piece consists of an introduction, seven sonatas and a finale. Accompanying the sonatas will be meditations delivered by local clergy.



Historic Fort Clinch, garrisoned during the Civil War and one of the best preserved nineteenth century forts in the country, will be the outdoor setting for Igor Stravinsky's "L'Histoire du Soldat" or "A Soldier's Tale." "A Soldier's Tale" is a 1918 theatrical piece "to be read, played, and danced." Set to music by Stravinsky, it is based on a Russian folk tale about a soldier who trades his fiddle to the devil for a book that predicts the future. Stravinsky scored the music for a small group—a septet of violin, double bass, clarinet, bassoon, cornet, trombone, and percussion—to compensate for a lack of players, since so many were enlisted in the army during World War I. The story is told by three actors: the soldier, the devil, and a narrator, who also takes on the roles of minor characters. A dancer plays the non-speaking role of the princess, while an ensemble of mimes also will perform. The setting will take full advantage of Fort Clinch's history and scenic views of the ocean and St. Mary's River.

Our special production of "A Soldier's Tale" will feature violinist Jennifer Koh, an Amelia Island favorite and Grammy nominee, recognized for her expertise in interpreting Stravinsky. Since the 1994-95 season when she won the International Tchaikovsky Competition in Moscow, the Concert Artists Guild Competition, and the Avery Fisher Career Grant, Jennifer Koh has performed with leading orchestras and conductors around the world. Committed to exploring connections between the pieces she plays and searching for similarities of voice between different composers, her programs often present revealing juxtapositions, offering works by composers as divergent as Mozart, Ornette Coleman, Schubert and Wuorinen.


