

Rebecca Anderson. a Resident Fellowship Artist, is a student at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia.



Wendy Chen. At the age of fifteen, Wendy Chen debuted with the Los Angeles Philharmonic under conductor André Previn. In 1990 she became the youngest winner ever of the National Chopin Competition,

was one of the inaugural recipients of the Irving S. Gilmore Young Artists Award, and was named a Presidential Scholar by the National Foundation for the Arts. Over the past decade her career has



flourished, adding winner of the Young Concert Artists International Auditions and Washington International Competition to her numerous awards.

David Coucheron.

Recently named Concertmaster of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, David Coucheron boasts an impeccable pedigree, with degrees from Philadelphia's Curtis Institute, New York's Juilliard School and London's Guildhall School of Music and Drama. He has been soloist with the world's top orchestras, including the BBC Symphony Orchestra and Oslo Philharmonic.



Andres Diaz. Born in Santiago, Chile, cellist Andres Diaz won first prize in the 1986 Naumburg International Cello Competition. Since then, he has made many orchestral and recital appearances with symphonies in the United States, Europe, the Far East and South America. Awarded the prestigious Avery Fisher Career Grant in 1998, he plays a 1698 Matteo Goffriller cello with a bow made by his father, Manuel Diaz.



Roberto Diaz is former principal violist of the Philadelphia Orchestra and president of the Curtis Institute of Music. As a renowned recitalist,



he is frequently heard as a member of the Diaz Trio, with violinist Andrés Cárdenes and cellist Andrés Díaz, with whom he has performed throughout the United States, Canada, Europe, Mexico and Chile. He has received numerous awards, including prizes at the Naumburg and Munich international viola competitions.

James Dunham. Soloist, chamber musician and teacher, James Dunham is active internationally as a recitalist and guest artist. He has collaborated with such

renowned artists as Emmanuel Ax, Joshua Bell, Lynn Harrell, Cho-Liang Lin and members of the American, Guarneri, Juilliard, Takács and Tokyo Quartets.



Eroica Trio.

The Grammy-nominated Eroica Trio, among the most sought-after chamber ensembles in the world, is one of the first all-female ensembles to reach the top echelon of its field. The women of the Eroica Trio electrify the international concert stage with their flawless technical virtuosity, irresistible enthusiasm and sensual elegance. The Trio won the prestigious 1991 Naumburg Award, resulting in a highly successful Lincoln Center debut and has since toured the United States, Europe and Asia. While maintaining its demanding concert schedule, the Eroica Trio has released seven critically lauded recordings for Angel/EMI Classics Records, garnering multiple Grammy nominations.



Karen Gomyo. Recipient of the prestigious Avery Fisher Career Grant in 2008, Canadian violinist Karen Gomyo first caught public attention just one week after

her fifteenth birthday when she won the 1997 Young Concert Artists International Auditions. She became the youngest artist ever to be presented in the Young Concert Artists Series, in a critically acclaimed

New York debut as recipient of the Summis Auspicis Prize. She since has ever since been heard as soloist, recitalist, and chamber musician across the U.S., Canada, South America, Europe, and Asia.

David Halen is considered one of the nation's finest concertmasters. His concertmaster experience began with the Houston Symphony under Christoph Eschenbach, and he has served as concertmaster with the St. Louis Symphony under Leonard Slatkin, the late Hans Vonk and currently David Robertson. Mr. Halen plays a 1753 Giovanni Battista Guadagnini violin, made in Milan, Italy.



Reid Harris is now in his thirty-first season as principal violist of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra. He is a founding member of the Georgian Chamber Players.



Natalie Helm, cello for the Resident Fellowship Artists, is a student at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia.



Alicia Hui, violin for the Resident Fellowship Artists, is a student at the Cleveland Institute of Music.

Ran Jia, piano, for the Resident Fellowship Artists, is a student at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia.



Elissa Koljonen. Violinist Elissa Lee Koljonen has thrilled audiences and critics in over 100 cities throughout the world. She initially received international acclaim when she became the first




recipient of the prestigious Henryk Szeryng Foundation Award and silver medalist of the Carl Flesch International Violin Competition. As a recitalist, Ms. Koljonen has performed in many musical capitals including London, Amsterdam, Salzburg, Seoul, Washington, D.C., Philadelphia and New York. Also an avid chamber musician, Ms. Koljonen appears regularly at festivals throughout North America, Europe and Asia.



Valentina Lisitsa. Born to a family of non-musicians in Kiev, Ukraine, Valentina started playing piano at age three and performed her first solo performance at four. She attended the Kiev Conservatory, and while there, met Alexi Kuznetsoff, her future husband and partner in duopianism. The couple made their U.S. debut in 1991 at the Mostly Mozart Festival at Lincoln Center. Valentina also has established herself as a soloist, performing at many of the world's most prestigious venues, including New York's Carnegie Hall and Avery Fisher Hall, Vienna's Musikverein and Amsterdam's Concertgebouw.

Robert McDuffie. Internationally acclaimed violinist Robert McDuffie has appeared as soloist with many of the major orchestras of the world, including the New York and Los Angeles Philharmonics; the



Chicago, Montreal, and Toronto Symphonies; the Philadelphia, Cleveland, and Leipzig Gewandhaus orchestras; the North German Radio and Frankfurt Radio Orchestras; the Deutsche Kammerphilharmonie Bremen; and all of the major orchestras of Australia. He returns to Rome each June as the co-founder and artistic director of The Rome Chamber Music Festival. McDuffie also is Distinguished University Professor of Music at Mercer University, where he heads The Robert McDuffie Center for Strings.



Sarah McElvray, a past performer with the Resident Fellowship Artists, is the first violinist in the Linden String Quartet, which is the

most recent winner of the Gold Medal at the prestigious Fishoff Competition. The Linden String Quartet has just been awarded a residency at Yale University.

Steve Moretti performs extensively throughout the country and is among the most sought after young drummers of his generation. Recognized for his high energy and versatility, Steve has been lauded for his "authoritative command" and hailed as "explosive," "sparkling," "a driving force," and "impressively sensitive." He toured and recorded with the legendary Rosemary Clooney for six years.





St. Lawrence String Quartet.

Having walked on stage together nearly 2,000 times over the last 20 years, the St. Lawrence String Quartet has established itself as one of the world-class chamber ensembles of its generation. Throughout this time, the quartet has delighted audiences with its spontaneous, passionate, and dynamic performances, as well as a more informal style than one might expect from chamber musicians. Alex Ross of The New Yorker magazine writes, "the St. Lawrence are remarkable not simply for the quality of their music making, exalted as it is, but for the joy they take in the act of connection."



Kurt Muroki.

Double bassist Kurt Muroki, newly appointed to the faculty at New York University and the McDuffie Center for Strings at Mercer

University, has collaborated with the Guarneri, Juilliard, and Tokyo string quartets. A native of Maui, Hawaii, Mr. Muroki plays a double bass once owned by Domenico Dragonetti and attributed to Nicolo Amati circa 1665.

Helen Nightengale.

A graduate of Eastman and Indiana University, Helen Nightengale is currently the



Founding Director of the Angeli Ensemble in Los Angeles. She has held the positions of co-concertmaster of the London Symphony and Associate Concertmaster of the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra. She performs on the 1736 Pollitzer-Koessler Guarneri del Gesu.

Philip Pan.

Having received a Bachelor and Masters of Music from The Juilliard School, Philip Pan has been Concertmaster of the Jacksonville Symphony since 1984.



Roberto Papi, viola, for the Resident Fellowship Artists, is a student at Rice University.



William Preucil was named concertmaster of The Cleveland Orchestra in 1995. Previously, he was

first violinist of the Cleveland Quartet from 1989 to 1995 and concertmaster of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra from 1982 to 1989. Mr. Preucil has appeared frequently as a recitalist, chamber musician and soloist with orchestras and at major chamber music festivals in the U.S. and abroad. He is Distinguished Professor of Violin at the Cleveland Institute of Music.

Elizabeth Pridgen, a past performer with the Resident Fellowship Artists, has just been named Distinguished Artist and Piano



Chair at the McDuffie Center for Strings. A graduate of Peabody and Juilliard, Ms. Pridgen has performed with such artists as Elmar Oliveira, Robert McDuffie, Andres Diaz, Lynn Harrell, Hilary Hahn, Sarah Chang, Peter Wiley, Anne Akiko Meyers, Jennifer Koh and Mark O'Connor.

Andrew Rangell studied at New York's Juilliard School of Music, obtaining a doctorate in piano. He won the Malraux Award of the Concert Artists Guild, leading to his New York debut. In 1988 he received the Avery Fisher Career Development Grant. He is

best known for his performances of all 32 of Beethoven's piano sonatas and J.S. Bach's Goldberg Variations.

Resident Fellowship Artists.

Through our Resident Fellowship Artists Program, promising music students from the nation's top conservatories, are selected each year to participate in the Festival. They are instructed by and perform with Festival guest artists, who guide the residency activities of the RFA students.

Christopher Rex, general and artistic director of The Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival, is principal cellist of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, a position he has held since 1979. Also in that year, he became the first cellist ever to win the string prize in the biennial Young Artists Competition of the National Federation of Music



Clubs. Following his studies at the Curtis Institute of Music with Orlando Cole and at the Juilliard School with Leonard Rose, he was a member of the Philadelphia Orchestra under director Eugene Ormandy for seven seasons. An active recitalist and chamber musician at venues around the nation, Rex serves on the board of directors of Chamber Music America.




Jessica Rivera, hailed by the New York Times as a "vocally luminous young soprano," is quickly establishing

herself as one of the most creative vocal artists of her generation. The intelligence, dimension and spirituality that she infuses in her performances on the international concert and opera stages have garnered her artistic collaborations with many of today's most celebrated composers, including John Adams, Osvaldo Golijov and Nico Muhly.

Robert Spano. Now in his fifth season as music director of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra,

Robert Spano is recognized as one of the most imaginative conductors of his generation. He received his bachelor of music in piano from Oberlin College and then studied conducting at the Curtis Institute of Music. He has played concertos with orchestras around the country, but most of his piano performances have focused on chamber music and lieder.



Arnold Steinhardt made his solo debut with the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra at age 14. He studied with Ivan Galamian at

the Curtis Institute of Music and with Joseph Szigeti in Switzerland in 1962 under the sponsorship of George Szell. Winner of the Philadelphia Youth Competition in 1957, the 1958 Leventritt Award, and Bronze Medalist in the Queen Elizabeth International Violin Competition in 1963, Mr. Steinhardt has appeared throughout North America and Europe as a recitalist and soloist. He was first violinist and a founding member (1964) of the internationally acclaimed Guarneri String Quartet with which he toured the globe and recorded dozens of albums for RCA Victor, Philips, Arabesque and Surrounded By Entertainment.

Sabina Thatcher. A graduate of the Eastman School of Music and The Juilliard School, Sabina Thatcher began her tenure as principal violist of the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra in St. Paul, Minnesota, in 1989. Thatcher is a faculty member at the Aspen Music Festival and School, a

Distinguished Artist of the McDuffie Center for Strings at Mercer University.



Jay Ungar and Molly Mason are extraordinary musicians. If you did not know it before, you certainly did after Ken Burns' *The Civil War* hit the airwaves in 1990. Their performance of Jay's haunting composition *Ashokan Farewell*, the musical hallmark of the PBS series, earned the couple international acclaim.



The Civil War soundtrack won a Grammy and *Ashokan Farewell* was nominated for an Emmy. Since joining forces in the late 1970s, Jay and Molly have become one of the most celebrated duos on the American acoustic music scene. The couple's repertoire includes timeless renditions of hard-driving Appalachian, Cajun and Celtic fiddle tunes, stirring Civil War classics, sassy songs from the golden age of swing and country, stunning waltzes and their own deeply moving compositions.



André Watts burst upon the music world in 1963 at the age of 16 when Leonard Bernstein chose him to make his debut with

the New York Philharmonic in their Young People's Concerts, broadcast nationwide on CBS-TV. Two weeks later, Bernstein asked him to substitute at the last minute for the ailing Glenn Gould in performances of Liszt's E-flat Concerto with the New York Philharmonic, thus launching his career in storybook fashion. More than 45 years later, André Watts remains one of today's most celebrated superstars.




