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# Festival Performers

**VICTOR SANTIAGO ASUNCION, piano:** Asuncion has performed in recital in his native Philippines, in Canada, Japan and Mexico, and in major venues in the United States. He is on the chamber music faculty of the Aspen Music Festival and School. His performances have been broadcast on NPR's *Performance Today*.

**LAURIE CASSEDAY, cellist:** Casseday has been a member of the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra since 1986 and a faculty member of the University of North Florida since 1997.

**VICTORIA CHIANG, viola:** Chiang has appeared as soloist, chamber musician and recitalist throughout the United States and Canada as well as in Europe. Chiang is one of the founding members of the Aspen Ensemble, a quintet of flute, piano and strings.

**ROBERTO DIAZ, viola:** One of the most sought-after violists, Diaz has appeared as soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra, the National Symphony, the New World Symphony in Miami, the Boston Pops, and numerous other orchestras throughout Europe.

**JAMES DUNHAM, viola:** Dunham is an internationally known soloist, chamber musician and teacher. He spends summers at a variety of festivals, including the San Diego Mainly Mozart (Principal Viola), Aspen, Domaine Forget, Amelia Island and Festival der Zukunft.

**EVE GIGLIOTTI, vocalist:** Following completion of her Masters in Opera at The Curtis Institute of Music, Gigliotti spent nine months as a Young Artist with the Seattle Opera where she performed Mimi in *La Bohème*. Her chamber music work includes the world premiere of David Ludwig's song cycle *Sonnets from the Portuguese* based on the poetry of Elizabeth Barrett Browning.



**GUARNERI QUARTET, Arnold Steinhardt, violin; John Dalley, violin; Michael Tree, viola; Peter Wiley, cello:** The renowned Guarneri String Quartet has played in the world's most prestigious halls in North and South America, Mexico, Europe, Asia and Australia. They also continue their annual Metropolitan Museum of Art six-concert series and residency at the University of Maryland. The Quartet has been featured on many television and radio specials, documentaries and educational presentations both in North America and abroad. A full-length film entitled "High Fidelity—The Guarneri String Quartet" was released nationally, to great critical and public acclaim, in the fall of 1989. In 1982, Mayor Koch presented the Quartet with the first New York Seal of

Recognition. The Guarneri String Quartet currently records for Surrounded by Entertainment. Several of its recordings have won international awards.



**HILARY HAHN, violin:** Hahn began playing the violin a month before her fourth birthday in the Suzuki program of Baltimore's Peabody Conservatory. Admitted to Philadelphia's Curtis Institute of Music in 1990 at the age of ten, Hahn

made her major orchestral debut with the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra in December 1991. Her Philadelphia Orchestra debut in 1993 was followed by appearances with the Cleveland Orchestra, the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra and the New York Philharmonic. Hahn has established herself as one of the most accomplished and compelling artists on the international concert circuit. Following her 1995 debut with the Bavarian Radio Symphony Orchestra, a critic stated that her playing belonged "to those rare talents one encounters once in a century." She is an avid chamber musician and performs regularly with the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center and at the Marlboro Festival in Vermont. Hahn was named "America's Best" classical musician by *Time Magazine* in July 2001. In 2003, Ms. Hahn won the Grammy Award for best soloist with orchestra. She returns for her second season with the Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival.



**LYNN HARRELL, cello:** A consummate soloist, chamber musician, recitalist, conductor and teacher, Lynn Harrell's work in America, Europe and Asia has placed him in the highest echelon of today's performing artists. Harrell has performed with the Boston and Chicago symphonies, Los Angeles Philharmonic, Philadelphia Orchestra, the London Philharmonic, and the Israel Philharmonic. Additional highlights include a two-week tour to Japan with Vladimir Ashkenazy and Pinchas Zukerman, and a three-week "Lynn Harrell Cello Festival" with the Hong Kong Philharmonic. Harrell has, for nearly 50 years, spent his summers performing and teaching at the Aspen Music Festival. High-lights from more than 30 recordings include the complete Bach Cello Suites, two recordings of the Dvorak Concerto, and the Donald Erb Concerto with Leonard Slatkin and the Saint Louis Symphony. Together with Itzhak Perlman and Vladimir Ashkenazy, Mr. Harrell won two Grammy Awards. Harrell has taught at the Juilliard School, Cincinnati Conservatory, Cleveland Institute of Music, UCLA, USC and the Royal Academy in London, and is currently on the faculty of the Shepherd School of Music. He is



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the recipient of numerous awards, including the first Avery Fisher Award.

**REID HARRIS, viola:** Harris has been the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra's Principal Viola since 1979. Prior to coming to Atlanta, he was Assistant Principal Viola of the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra. Harris studied at the Cleveland Institute of Music and is a frequent soloist with the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra. He is a founding member of the Georgia Chamber Players.

**DENNIS HUNSICKER, bandoneon:** Hunsicker's eclectic interests began in Pennsylvania where he studied at the Neupauer Conservatory of Music. He toured the United States and Europe as a member of Cinclant (NATO) band. He currently teaches and plays in the Jacksonville area as a member of the Palm Court Society Orchestra, La Dolce Vita, and the River City Continentals.

**COLIN JACOBSEN, violin (Amelia Fellowship Artist):** Colin Jacobsen first played to critical acclaim at age fourteen when he performed with the New York Philharmonic, and in recent years has pursued a varied career of solo and chamber music engagements. He was a touring member of Yo-Yo Ma's Silk Road Project and he participated in the Second International Jerusalem Chamber Music Encounters led by Isaac Stern. Jacobsen graduated in 1999 from the Juilliard School where he received the Grand Prize from both the New York State and National American String Teachers Association Competitions. He is a member of the acclaimed Concertante Chamber Players and plays a Guarneri violin crafted in 1696.

**JACKSONVILLE BRASS QUINTET,** Cliff Newton, trumpet; Charles Matthiessen, trumpet; Aaron Brask, horn; Jeff Petersen, trombone; James Jenkins, tuba: The Jacksonville Brass Quintet was formed in 1978 to perform brass ensemble concerts in the North Florida area. The group is known for its varied repertoire. Cliff Newton, principal trumpet of the JSO, joined the group in 1979. Charles Matthiessen, also a member of the JSO, has served on the faculty of Brevard Music Center. Horn player Aaron Brask has several successful solo CDs to his credit and trombonist Jeff Petersen has served orchestras in Mexico and Spain. James Jenkins, tuba, focuses his energies on his "Body and Soul" concerts which bring live music and personal interaction to hospitalized seniors.

**YEON-SUN JOO, cello (Resident Young Artist):** Yeon-Sun holds the Bok Foundation Fellowship at the Curtis Institute of Music where she has studied since 1997. She has performed as soloist with such orchestras as the Seoul Philharmonic and the World Symphony, an active chamber musician, she has performed in duos with Itzhak Perlman and Lorin Maazel.

**KIM KASHKASHIAN, viola:** Kashkashian has established herself as one of the most accomplished artists of her generation, appearing as a soloist with major orchestras in the United States, Europe and the Far East. Included in her extensive discography is a recording of

concertos by Bartók, Eötvös and Kurtág that won the 2001 Cannes Classical Award for a Premiere Recording by a Soloist with Orchestra. She graduated from the Peabody Conservatory of Music and has taught at the University of Indiana, conservatories in Berlin and Freiburg, Germany and at the New England Conservatory.

**CARRIE KENNEDY, violin (Resident Young Artist):** Kennedy is currently pursuing her Bachelor of Music Degree in Violin Performance at the University of Southern California. She has performed as soloist with a variety of orchestras across the U.S. and as the first violinist of the Kalos Quartet, has performed concerts in France at the French-American Chamber Music Festival.

**ALEXEI KUZNETSOFF, piano:** Kuznetsoff and his wife Valentina Lisitsa virtually exploded onto the American musical scene in their formal U.S. Debut in Chicago. The couple began working as a team with the revered Dr. Ludmilla Tsvierko in Kiev, under whose tutelage they won several prestigious prizes. This is their second appearance at the Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival.

**SUZANNE LEFEVRE, viola:** LeFevre came to the Charlotte Symphony Orchestra after four seasons as principal viola with the Louisiana Philharmonic. She has played with the Netherlands Philharmonic Orchestra, New Haven Symphony, Milwaukee Symphony, Milwaukee Ballet Orchestra, and Chicago Sinfonietta, been co-principal viola at the Colorado Music Festival for six years and is a tenured member of the Peninsula Music Festival in Wisconsin. She is a member of the Assai Quartet and received the Elizabeth Battel-Stoeckel award for excellence in Chamber Music.



**CHO-LIANG LIN, violin:** Cho-Liang is known internationally for the beauty of his sound, technical mastery and superb musical interpretation, and has appeared with major orchestras and on renowned recital and chamber music series.

Cho-Liang Lin's recordings on the Sony label have won Gramophone awards and Grammy nominations, as well as *Stereo Review's* "Record of the Year" honors.



**VALENTINA LISITSA, piano:** Ukrainian born pianist Lisitsa is capturing the attention of audiences throughout the world for her stunning virtuosity and unequalled sense of lyricism. Widely known and respected as a duo-pianist with her husband Alexei

Kuznetsoff, the couple won prizes in the Murray Dranoff Two Pianos Competition, Concertina Prague, and the Lysenko Piano Competition, the Paris Chamber Music Competition, and the Ukrainian Chamber

Music Competition. Lisitsa was the subject of a recent television program entitled *Valentina in Miami*, a one-hour music special produced by Miami's PBS affiliate.



**ROBERT McDUFFIE, violin:** McDuffie has appeared as soloist with many of the world's major orchestras. He is a Grammy-nominated artist whose acclaimed recordings for Telarc include the violin concertos of Mendelssohn, Bruch,

Adams, Glass, Barber, and Rozsa, as well as Viennese favorites. This season he performs in Europe and in the United States. He also plays with the Orchestra of St. Luke's at the Caramoor Festival and makes his annual appearances at the Aspen Music Festival. Robert McDuffie has been profiled on NBC's *Today*, CBS *Sunday Morning*, PBS's *Charlie Rose*, A&E's *Breakfast with the Arts*, and in *The New York Times* and *The Wall Street Journal*.

**KURT MUROKI, double bass:** Muroki, a native of Maui, Hawaii, began his musical studies on violin and went on to study the double bass at the Juilliard School of Music. Muroki began performing with the Sejong Soloists and was appointed Principal Bassist of the New World Symphony, and has played with Concertante Chamber Players, Metamorphosen Chamber Orchestra, Speculum Musicae, and EOS Orchestra. Muroki has won numerous competitions and has also performed concert tours throughout Asia and the United States.

**BETH NEWDOME, violin:** Beth Newdome recently joined Florida State University as Assistant Professor of Violin after serving as the Associate Concertmaster of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra. As a member of The Georgian Chamber Players she collaborates with nationally and internationally acclaimed soloists. In addition to their series at Spivey Hall in Georgia, the players debuted at Carnegie's Weill Recital Hall in November 2001.

**HELEN NIGHTINGALE, violin:** Currently associate concertmaster of the London Symphony Orchestra and founding member of the Kandinsky String Trio, Nightingale has held concertmaster positions in several orchestras, including the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra, Los Angeles Opera and the prestigious Lower Saxony State Opera in Hannover, Germany. Her career has included engagements in Central America and performances with the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra in Tokyo and Osaka, Japan.



**ELMAR OLIVEIRA, violin:** Among his generation's most honored artists, Oliveira is the only American violinist to win the Gold Medal at Moscow's Tchaikovsky International Competition, and is the first violinist to receive the coveted Avery

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Fisher Prize. He has toured the Far East, South America, Australia, New Zealand, and regularly performs at the Mostly Mozart, Seattle, Grant Park, Blossom, and Chautauqua summer music festivals. Critically acclaimed for his performances of the standard violin literature, he is also a much sought-after interpreter of the music of our time, premiering works by many distinguished contemporary composers. A prodigious recording artist, Oliveira is a two-time Grammy nominee and his best-selling recording of the Rautavaara Violin Concerto with the Helsinki Philharmonic won a Cannes Classical Award. The Prime Minister of Portugal recently awarded Mr. Oliveira the country's highest civilian honor, The Order of Santiago.

**STANFORD OLSEN, vocalist:** Olsen is one of the world's leading light lyric tenors and has performed with New York's Metropolitan Opera and at such major venues as La Scala, Australian Opera, Deutsche Oper Berlin, and San Francisco Opera. He has performed at the Ravinia, Tanglewood and Salzburg festivals, and is a regular guest with the Philadelphia, San Francisco, and Atlanta orchestras. His recordings of Bach, Mozart and Rossini have received critical praise, including Grammy Award nominations. He is currently Professor of Voice at Florida State University.



**PHILIP PAN, violin:** Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra Concertmaster Philip Pan has performed with the JSO since 1984, frequently as soloist. He can be heard in concert with three local chamber groups he helped found: Synergy, the St. Johns

Chamber Players and the St. Mark's Bach Ensemble. Philip Pan is a graduate of the Juilliard School of Music.



**ANTONIO POMPA-BALDI, pianist:** Pompa-Baldi emerged from the Eleventh Van Cliburn International Piano Competition in June 2001 with both a silver medal and the Phyllis Jones Tilley Award for the Best Performance of a New Work. Pompa-Baldi was also the first-prize winner of the 1999 Cleveland Competition and a top prizewinner of the 1998 Marguerite Long-Jacques Thibaud Competition. He has played extensively throughout the United States and Europe as a recitalist and soloist. During the summer of 2002, Pompa-Baldi performed with the Boston Pops Orchestra and was featured in recital at the internationally acclaimed Chopin Festival Poland. In addition, he taught and performed at both the TCU/Cliburn Piano Institute in Fort Worth and Pianofest in Long Island. He also served as a juror at the Van Cliburn Foundation's third International Piano Competition for Outstanding Amateurs and at the Oberlin International Piano Competition. He was featured in *Playing on the*

*Edge*, the Peabody Award-winning PBS documentary on the Eleventh Van Cliburn International Piano Competition. A native of Foggia, Italy, Pompa-Baldi is a well-regarded teacher recently serving as assistant professor at the Oberlin Conservatory and as artist-in-residence at Cuyahoga Community College in Cleveland.

**ELIZABETH PRIDGEN, piano (Resident Young Artist):** Pridgen is currently a graduate student at the Juilliard School studying with Joseph Kalichstein. She graduated in May 2001 from the Peabody Conservatory of Music. For the past ten years, Pridgen has performed with her grandfather, violinist Martin Sauser, former Concertmaster of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, and for arts organizations and colleges throughout the Southeast. Recently she performed with the Dekalb and Rome Symphonies in Georgia, and at Alice Tully Hall in New York City.

**WILLIAM PURVIS, French horn:** Purvis pursues a multifaceted career both in the U.S. and abroad as French horn soloist, chamber musician and conductor. He appears with the Chamber Music Society, and is a member of the New York Woodwind Quintet, Orpheus, the Orchestra of St. Luke's. Many recordings of contemporary music featuring Mr. Purvis as conductor are included in his discography. Purvis is a member of the faculties of the Yale University School of Music, The Juilliard School and the State University of New York at Stony Brook.

**VIRGINIA RESPESSE, violin (Resident Young Artist):** Respess received her Bachelor of Music Degree from Indiana University in 2000. In 1999, Respess was awarded the Indiana University Kuttner Memorial Scholarship. In 2000, after completing her undergraduate degree, she joined the Civic Orchestra of Chicago. Currently, she is working on a Performer Diploma at Indiana University and is pursuing her Masters of Music.

**CHARLES REX, violin:** Rex started his violin studies at age four and made his debut with the Florida Symphony at age 13. Immediately after graduating cum laude from Florida State University, he joined the Philadelphia Orchestra where he played for eight years before accepting the position of Associate Concertmaster of the New York Philharmonic under Zubin Mehta. He is currently the concertmaster of the Oregon Festival of America.



**CHRISTOPHER REX, cello:** Christopher Rex joined the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra as Principal Cello in 1979, the same year he became the first cellist to win the string prize in the biennial Young Artists Competition of the National Federation of Music Clubs. He has appeared as a recitalist and chamber musician across the nation. Rex was a member of the Philadelphia Orchestra following his studies at the Curtis Institute of Music with Orlando Cole and the Juilliard

School. He is a founding member of the Georgian Chamber Players. Rex's most recent solo appearances with the Atlanta Symphony include performances of the Shostakovich Concerto No.1, the Vivaldi Double Concerto for Two Cellos, and the Elgar Cello Concerto. In February 2001, Christopher and his brother Charles Rex presented a program in Carnegie's Weill Recital Hall as a tribute to their father, Charles Gordon Rex, Sr. Only music composed by Rex, Sr. was performed. Rex returns to the Amelia Island Chamber Music Festival as Artistic Director, as a featured performer, and sits on the Board of Directors as a founding member of the Festival.

**MARGUERITE RICHARDSON, violin:** Richardson has been a member of the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra since 1990. She has performed both symphonic and chamber music in the U.S., Italy, Germany, England, Costa Rica and El Salvador. Ms. Richardson performs regularly as recitalist and chamber musician and is a founding member of the Florida Arts Trio. She has earned degrees from The Cleveland Institute of Music, The University of South Carolina, and is currently a Doctoral Candidate at Florida State University.

**SANDRA ROBBINS, viola:** A member of the Ysaye Quartet, the Paganini Trio and the Bronx Arts Ensemble, Robbins has performed in chamber music concerts and at many festivals such as Aspen, Caramoor, Vermont Mozart, Kneisel Hall and Festival Musicales in France. She is currently a member of the American Composers Orchestra and The Westchester Philharmonic.



**DONALD RUNNICLES, conductor, pianist:** One of his generation's most distinguished conductors in both operatic and symphonic repertoire, Runnicles is the American Symphony Orchestra's Principal Guest Conductor. He is the Music Director of the San Francisco Opera, and was recently appointed Principal Conductor of the Orchestra of St. Luke's in New York. He regularly conducts the Chicago Symphony, the San Francisco Symphony, and Pittsburgh Symphony and has appeared with the Bavarian Radio Symphony, NDR Symphony Orchestra, l'Orchestra de Paris, Dresden Staatskapelle, and the Rotterdam Philharmonic, among others. In addition to his distinguished conducting career, Runnicles is an accomplished pianist and, for his own pleasure, often performs with chamber music groups.

**KARINA SCHMITZ, viola (Resident Young Artist):** Schmitz received her Bachelor's Degree in Music from the Cleveland Institute of Music where she won the Concerto Competition and several other awards. She has performed at Encore, the Baroque Performance Institute, the Quartet Program and Greenwood Music Camp. She is currently the youngest member of Apollo's Fire, Cleveland's Baroque Orchestra.

**ANDRÉ-MICHEL SCHUB,** piano: Winner of the Naumberg International Piano Competition in 1974, 1977 recipient of the Avery Fisher Recital Award and 1981 Grand Prize winner of the Van Cliburn International Piano Competition, Schub

has carved a distinguished career since making his recital debut at New York's Alice Tully Hall. His annual schedule always includes recitals in major concert halls as well as appearances at the foremost music festivals, among them Mostly Mozart, Tanglewood, Ravinia, the Mann Music Center, the Blossom Festival. He is the Artistic Director of the Virginia Waterfront International Arts Festival and in 1998 was named Artistic Director of the Eastern Music Festival. **THE TAKÁCS QUARTET,** Edward Dusinberre, violin; Károly Schranz, violin; Roger Tapping, viola; András Fejér, cello: The Takács Quartet is recognized as one of the world's greatest

string quartets. Since its formation in 1975, the ensemble has appeared regularly in every major music capital and prestigious festival. The quartet is based in Boulder, Colorado where it holds a Residency at the University of Colorado. The first volume of the Takács Quartet's Beethoven Cycle was released in May 2002 and received the Gramophone "Chamber Music Recording of the Year." The Quartet's recording of the Bartók cycle received the coveted Gramophone award for 1998 and was subsequently nominated for a Grammy. The ensemble's recordings for Decca/London includes the Schubert "Trout" Quintet with Andreas Haefliger, piano (Grammy nominee, 2000), and Dvorak's *Quartet Op. 51* and *Piano Quintet Op. 81*. Volume two of the Beethoven cycle is to be released in spring, 2003, and the final volume is to appear in early 2005. During the 2002-2003 season, the Takács Quartet performs over forty concerts in the U.S., and tours extensively in Europe. The quartet made its North American debut tour in 1982. **SABINA THATCHER, viola:** Thatcher began her tenure as principal viola of The Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra in 1989, where she is fre-

quently a featured soloist. Thatcher is an active chamber musician, a member of the Rosalyra String Quartet and is a faculty member at the Aspen Music Festival and School. She is a graduate of the Eastman School of Music and did additional study with Lillian Fuchs at the Juilliard School.

**JEFF THAYER, violin:** Thayer is Assistant Concertmaster of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra where he holds The Delta Airlines Chair. He has appeared as soloist with numerous orchestras and festivals throughout the United States and Europe. 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
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
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
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


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Chamber music is instrumental music for an ensemble, usually from two to ten players. From about 1750, chamber music has been principally for string quartets (two violins, viola and cello), although string quartets as well as duets, trios, and quintets of four stringed instruments plus a piano or wind instrument have also been popular.

Several trends have emerged in 20th Century chamber music. Classical genres such as the string quartet were infused with contemporary idioms and techniques in the works of French composers Claude Debussy and Maurice Ravel, Hungarian Bela Bartok, Austrians Arnold Schoenberg and Anton Webern, Soviet Dmitry Shostakovich and American Elliott Carter. Chamber music ensembles of varied composition—often including voices, harp, guitar, and wind and percussion instruments—became primary vehicles for new music by composers such as Schoenberg, Webern, Igor Stravinsky and Pierre Boulez.

Chamber music, once the domain of amateurs playing for their own pleasure, has become increasingly popular with concert-hall audiences. Numerous professional chamber music groups flourish in Europe, North America and elsewhere throughout the world. Chamber music festivals generally are held in the summer months as this is the season that most musicians have the opportunity to devote to such activities. Often, the establishment of a successful chamber music festival in a community will attract other arts-oriented endeavors.

More recently, chamber music has begun to emerge as a very lively and often non-traditional form of musical presentation. Artists such as Yo-Yo Ma are exploring new combinations which often blend ethnic or folk with the more traditional approaches. As a result, chamber music is emerging as an art form which reaches out to many different types of people and cultures. ♦

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



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
